This presentation examines current trends and challenges in academic administration, offering practical solutions and highlighting the University of the Western Cape as a model of effective integration.





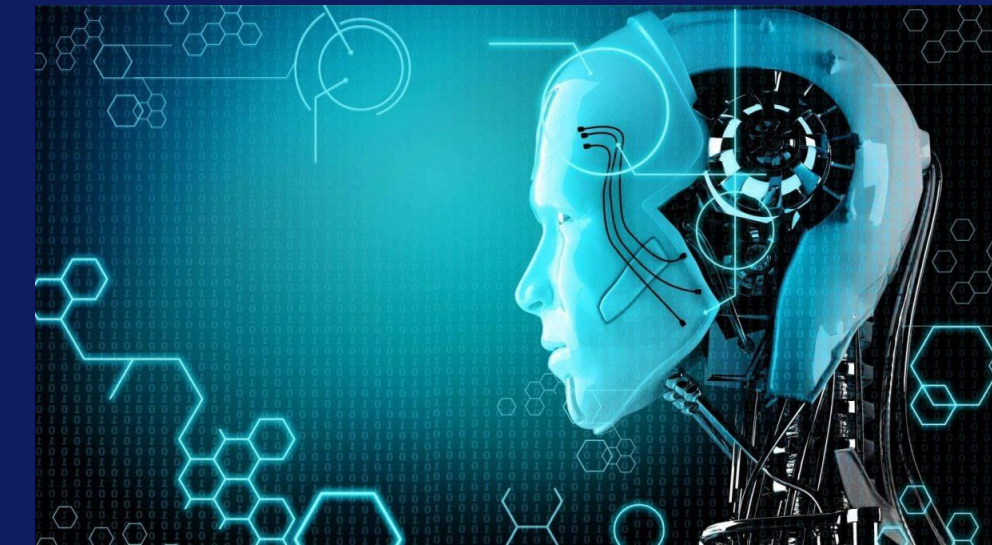
2. Current Status

Navigating these complexities requires thoughtful integration of tradition with innovation to ensure academic administration remains effective, student-focused and resilient.





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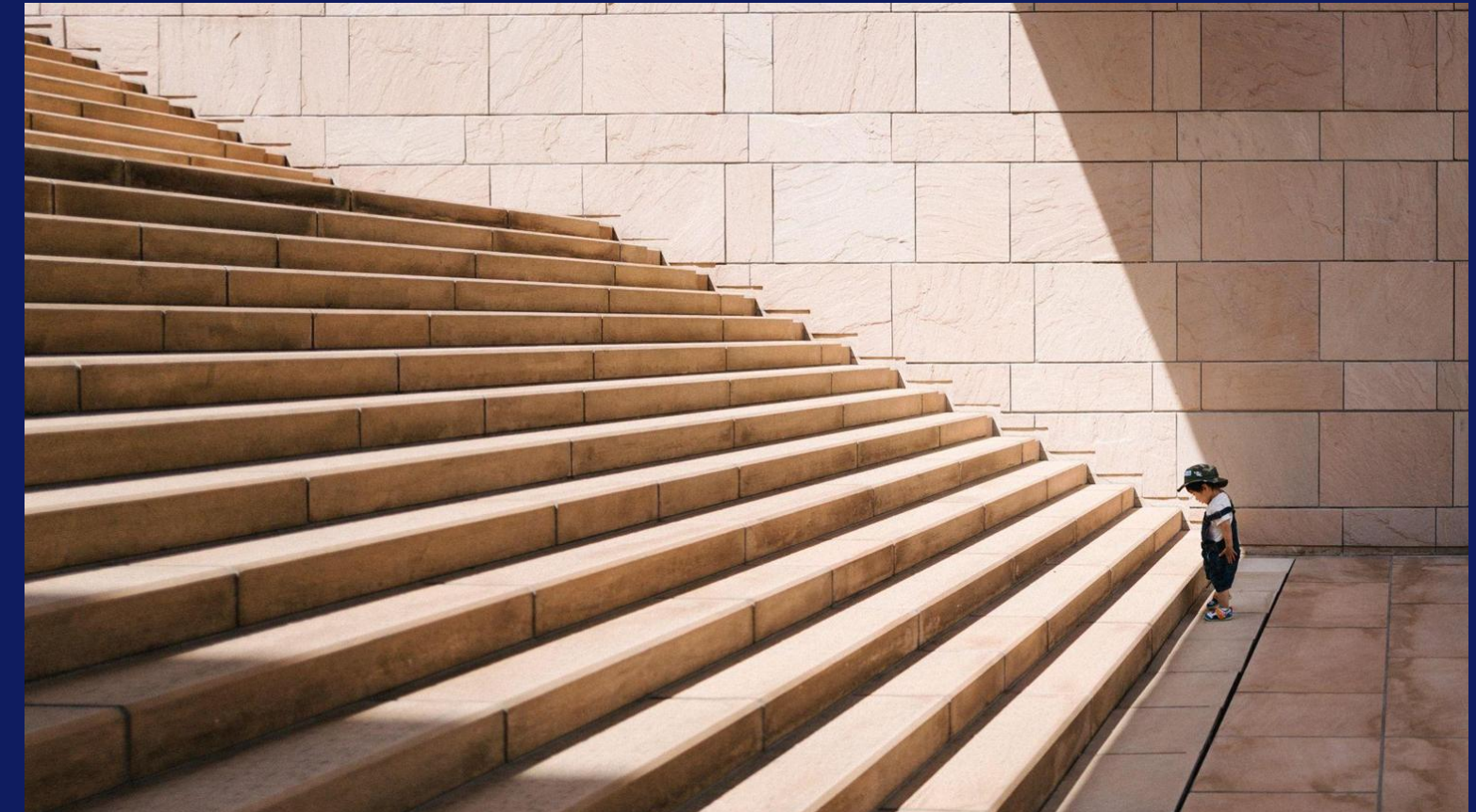


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3. Bridging the Gap
