

Responses from those who work in UK higher education institutions or those who partner closely with them – found via my extended networks



How do you think the circumstances of higher education institutions will change over the next 6 months?

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


How do you think the circumstances of higher education institutions will change over the next **5 years**?

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

What do you think is the biggest opportunity for the higher education sector at the moment?


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What do you think is the biggest challenge facing the higher education sector at the moment?

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A very brief history of UK HE



1960s	Major expansion in number of universities; Open University founded
1992	Further and Higher Education Act: polytechnics become universities
1998	Tuition fees introduced
2012	Tuition fees increased to a maximum of £9000 following the Browne review
2017	Most recent tuition fee increase to £9250


